FIVE GO ON A RUN SPREE

"NO MORE boom and bust," said Gordon Brown confidently, a few years before the sub-prime crisis smashed the global economy.

Strollers anoraks may have felt much the same hubris before 2016. The script dictated that James Tim-

perley and Jono Addis would battle it out for the highest individual score, total and average. The rest would limp to a few hundred runs in a good summer blessed with fast outfields.

This was the way of things. And none predicted the coming tidal wave. For in 2016, no fewer than five Strollers surged past the 500-run mark.

Between them, James Timperley, Aidan Selby, Hamish McDougall,

New ZEALAND TOUR ANNOUNCED At last Strollers

FOLLOWING years of speculation, the Strollers hierarchy has announced a New Zealand tour in February 2018. The visit will proceed despite rumours that New Zealand Civil Defence found the country structurally unsound after recent earthquakes and evacuated the population to South West London.

"That's just fake news," countered a mysterious Strollers insider. "Everyone knows the UK doesn't accept refugees." The tour decision was made after years of meticulous research

of earthquake-related news events and travel supplements endlessly referring to hobbits, orcs, wizards and eagles.

lar 2016 when he took 54 wickets at an average of 19.91, becoming only the fourth Stroller to capture more than 50 scalps in a season.

Stair attributed his success to an intense winter regime. Apparently, in order to strengthen his spinning finger he embarked on a selfless regime based on the manipulation of drinking vessels of various shapes and sizes, often for hours at a time.

The programme peaked with high-altitude training involving heavy-duty tankards on top of the West Stand at White Hart Lane.

"It was gruelling," admitted Macaulay between sips, "but it paid off. During the season, I found I was turning it [the ball] sideways."

Strollers technical guru Mike Morgan said: "It was a fantastic achievement. At times, Stair made Aaron Walder look like Robert Croft. Which is no mean feat.

"He has long been a master of flight and guile. Now, by adding turn to his repertoire, he is the finished article. No longer will his victims be dismissed as mere Frenchmen or children."

Unabashed by his record, Macaulay said: "I only hope the next generation of tweakers, the Laurie Allsopps and Tom Colbecks, will learn from my experience. Remember, with great

spinning power comes great responsibility," he added enigmatically.

Stair's rise up the Strollers bowling hierarchy was no overnight sensation. Since his debut in 1993 he has made sure but steady progress. His first "Michelle" (Pfeiffer – geddit?) came in 1996 and his previous best season's total of 37 in 2008.

In 2015 he topped the list of Strollers' seasonal wicket takers for the first time, with 32. But his 2016 haul put all these earlier performances in the shade.

His total of 54 is the ninth highest in a season by a Stroller. Only Warren Crocker, Simon

Brodbeck and Peter Patston have taken more in a summer. On hearing the news, Patston interrupted yet another half-marathon to announce his retirement from running in order to refocus on his bowling.

"Don't get me wrong," he said, "jogging in drizzle for four hours can be very wonderful and deeply moving. But it's nothing compared to bowling a well-set Aussie through the gate on some far-flung village green that is forever England in a dry September.

"Besides, the New Zealand tour's coming up and I'd like to see the ball turn the other way for a change." February has been identified as the optimum touring time, given that it will allow the Strollers to roast on the Wairarapa vine, hoop balls round corners at a muggy Kelburn Park, throw themselves in the harbour as part of post-match rehab and adjourn for a few snags on the barbie and a bottle of craft beer, or something stronger, as the sun sets over the Karori Hills.

It also coincides with the visit of the England cricket team, who will bring an assortment of red-headed Kiwis, grumpy northerners and South Africans to take on Kane Williamson's Black Caps.

McDougall said: "There is no point coming away for Christmas to the Land of the Long Grey Scudding Cloud and sitting in the shadow of the Vance stand, leeward to a gritty northerly, as the West Indies or Pakistan take their turn flaying Tim Southee round the Basin."

He also confirmed they have arranged for the wind and rain to come a year early: "It is a matter of forward planning and selfsacrifice," he said.

The biggest self-sacrifice for the Strollers next February may be missing beloved sports teams playing on murky Bath, Nottingham or Tottenham sports grounds. However, Ovenden and McDougall believe the jandal will be on the other foot when the tourists arrive, blinking like moles emerging from holes on the Great and Little Missenden outfield.

And the seafood is good too, or as the locals say here: "Tu meke kaimoana, eh."
